RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends in Christ,

In September, I and other church leaders were invited by the Presiding Bishop, The Most Reverend Michael Curry, to lead the House of Bishops of The Episcopal Church in a discussion at one of their morning sessions. Twice a year, the Bishops of the Church gather for business, fellowship, and learning. I was invited as a member of the House of Deputies Committee on the State of the Church, a committee that since 1821 has offered a report on the state of the church (hence the committee name) at our triennial church-wide conference, General Convention. I was fortunate to meet with Bishops from across the Church, servants elected to lead thousands of Episcopalians in their own contexts.

As my time at the House of Bishops came to an end, I felt energized and excited to return to Bellefonte. In being surrounded by our apostolic leaders, men and women called to lead our portion of the Church Catholic, I was filled with their support, prayers, and gratitude for our parish. Believe it or not, I met at least a dozen Bishops, not from Pennsylvania, who had visited our town!

As I'm filled with vigor and zeal to explore what the future holds for us as a parish, it's hard to believe that I have been serving as your rector for four months now. To be honest, it feels like it's been only a couple of weeks. At the same time, we have begun to take wonderful steps to help us better use and upgrade our church space. As I write this letter, our sacristy is getting a much-needed makeover, thanks to the generosity of Bette Shugert, Larry Roberson, and Jim Jackson.

And in a few weeks, I hope to no longer have an office. During my first month at the parish, I realized that this was no longer a necessity for our current parish staff structure, and in consultation with Ellen Dyakiw, I have decided to turn over my office to designate a space for our parish youth. However, our new youth room, like our Sunday school room, will allow me to hold pastoral meetings and private conversations.

Over the next few weeks, we will begin work on a new altar at the back of the church. This new altar will serve as our "mission altar." It will be a site where mass may be said and items for FaithCentre food pantry, Bellefonte Elementary School, and other mission partners will be collected. This altar will serve as a reminder of how the missional and sacramental are truly one; what we do in this sacred space and what we do out in the world are one in the same.

When I first arrived at Saint John's, the items we collected for our outreach efforts were nicely tucked away in bins underneath the back table. I'm committed to changing this practice, not to show off or feel great about ourselves, but to call us to be keenly aware of our Christian duty to give to those in need. Just as we have particular spaces for prayer and the Sacraments, we will have a particular space for mission and outreach, knowing full well that it is but a small site of God's call for us to join him in the Sacraments of the Church and in mission in the world.

After speaking with Deacon Alex and the vestry, I have decided to dedicate this altar to Saint Lawrence (AD 225-258), a deacon of the Church who, before being captured and put to death, sold the riches of the Church and gave the money to the poor. When asked to bring forth the wealth of the Church to the Roman



Empire, Saint Lawrence brought the poor, the children, and the widows, and said to the officials, "here are the riches of the Church!" It doesn't go by me that we have been blessed by Saint Lawrence's intercession at Saint John's in Deacon Alex's ministry. I'm glad to say that Deacon Alex isn't going anywhere anytime soon, except for much-earned time away for camping and fishing.

As I've shared with Deacon Alex, I hope that our new Saint Lawrence altar will encourage us as the Body of Christ to continue in God's mission. It will also serve to honor and thank Deacon Alex for his ministry among us all these years—a ministry that has strengthened and revitalized many to go forth to love and serve the Lord.

Throughout the month of October, you will find in the back of the church a special collection envelope for All Souls Day Remembrance, along with an additional form to write the names of your loved ones who have died. Please make sure to include their full Christian name and the anniversary of their death. If an exact date cannot be provided, please provide us with a month and a year. The reason for collecting this information is so that we may have an ongoing parish necrology (a list of the faithful departed) on file at the office.

Starting in November, on every first Wednesday of the month we will be offering a requiem mass for the faithful departed of the parish, those whom you have listed by name. My decision to collect this information and to offer a monthly requiem mass is shaped by the piety of this place, that is the ritual practices of you the people of Saint John's. From the generosity of gifts given in honor of the dead, to the weekly remembrances given for flowers and sanctuary candle, to the sight of your prayers at our columbarium, this is a place that deeply cares, loves, and remembers its dead. As a lifelong member of the Guild of All Souls, an Anglican society committed to praying for the dead, I share in your conviction. Most important of all, I share in your hope that the veil between this life and the life to come, the distance between us and our loved ones who are no longer here, is truly thin. And we can be certain of this hope because of Jesus' own death and resurrection, a resurrection in which we and all creation are promised to be partakers on

the last day. As all things have a way to connect, this year's All Souls collection will be used to prepare our new altar. Your generosity is greatly appreciated in this special effort.

As October marches on, please remember to bring your pets, or a picture of them, on Sunday, October 6, for our Blessing of the Animals. We will bless our closest companions as we remember the ministry and witness of Saint Francis of Assisi. Also, mark your calendars for our parish Picnic at the Dyakiw residence on **October 13**. Worship begins at 10 a.m., followed by a wonderful meal.

Please read through this issue of *The Herald* to learn more about what's going on in our parish. It is a joy to serve as your rector; thank you for this privilege. See you at mass.

I am beginning a new course with the Spiritual Care Association in New York. "First Responders Chaplaincy Training" is a 60-hour on-line course with FaceTime class work and much offline reading. I am doing this to perhaps extend my services as Chaplain to our EMT group in Bellefonte. I inquired one day to see if there is a need, and the response was a resounding YES, so please keep me in prayer for this.

I have also been appointed to the diocesan commission on ministry which meets the second Tuesday of each month in Harrisburg.
