RECTOR'S LETTER

Every month, Deb Cree, who, along with Kathryn Grossman, serves as editor of *The Herald*, sends a reminder to your parish leadership that articles and announcements are due. I'm thankful not only for Deb's



reminders (which I always need) but I'm thankful for their work compiling and editing our monthly newsletter. It allows me to share information with you about upcoming services, community events, and outreach initiatives. But it also grants me the opportunity to reflect on the work we've accomplished so far and the tasks God has invited us to take on.

In her email this month, Deb shared last year's February newsletter, in which you received a letter from your then rector-elect (me). You can find said newsletter on the church website here. It can sometimes be daunting to read one's previous written work; the fear of typos, outdated references, and failed imagery is too real. However, I want to share a portion of what I wrote to you a year ago:

"The number of possibilities and opportunities ahead of us not only outnumber the challenges, but invite us to dream and imagine from a place of Christian hope and joy. In due time, we will explore new and ancient ways to share God's love made known to us in Jesus Christ. We will discover ways to grow as individuals and as a community. We will succeed and fail. But at all times we can trust that God will be with us as he has been present with us through this process."

As I reflect on my words to you, and on everything we've been trying to do over the last seven months, I can honestly say that we are in a season of growth, in both our commitment to Christ and to one another.

Over the last few months, this parish has been hard at work developing a formation plan for the smallest to the eldest among us. Church studies have shown that intergenerational formation and worship is at the heart of healthy and vibrant parishes. We saw this on display during our Epiphany service as we took part in a solemn procession and blessing of the chalk, while having our children and youth lead us in this important ritual.

Likewise, we will see something similar on Candlemas

(February 2),



when our parish youth will lead us in this solemn ceremony, which (of course!) will be followed by a festive coffee hour and brunch in the fellowship hall. We will see this further during our Lenten stations of the cross as we offer learning apportunities for

the cross as we offer learning opportunities for children, youth, and adults.

This work is important not only for our future—the future of our children and the parish—but it's important for the present. It's important that we continue to grow, invite, and draw in all people to experience God's love, healing, and mercy. It is crucial that we as the body of Christ have space to nourish all its members, from the smallest to the eldest. This is exactly why a few months ago we began the work of repurposing my office for general

use, for small groups, and for Sunday school classes. We will rededicate and bless this new room on **Sunday, February 23** after the 10 a.m. solemn mass. I hope that you will join us to check out our new space.

It is my hope and prayer that you, too, have seen the energy and excitement in our parish. That you, too, have been moved by our worship, from the joyful noise of kids running to receive our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament to the glorious music offered by our choir. It is truly a joy to serve a parish that seeks to feed all of God's people.

FROM THE DEACON'S PERCH



I usually open this column with a verse or psalm, but before that, I wish to express my deepest gratitude to all of you at St. John's for your continual support of our ministry at the prison. With your help,

I received enough money to make a bulk purchase of 100 prayer books to be used by all the inmates in recovery programs. I use it each week to read a Psalm, verse, or Gospel, which we then discuss as it pertains to incarceration. The response is joyful, since many have never read a prayer—never mind owned a book for the first time—all made possible because of your support.

The other joyful time occurred recently at Centre Crest. As you know, I am the chaplain there and am on call for emergencies, hospice care, and spiritual well-being matters. In my twelve years of ordained ministry there, I've never had a request to baptize someone because of their declining health. I received a call that a 92-year-old resident was failing. He was very upset upon learning that he had never been

baptized, and he was eager to be baptized. Upon talking and reading the baptismal vows, he began to cry and quiver just as I was pouring water over him. Because of the great happiness I felt coming from him, I also began to cry and experienced joy in knowing that he would now be an heir to God's Kingdom.

The last bit of good news concerns the pierogi dinner we held on January 25. We broke a church record, serving 144 dinners and netting \$1600 in profit from this event. I was again taken by surprise at the number of people enjoying fellowship at this dinner and at all the take-outs. Most of all, I observed our church family—and I do mean *family*. Everybody was doing something: cooking, cleaning tables, washing dishes, serving, sweeping, taking trash out a family in full action. In particular, Fr. Carlos was fully involved with all aspects of the dinner, really connecting with all the visitors who asked questions about St. John's, our history, and the ways of the Episcopal church. I want to mention that whenever we have a function, our sister church, St. Andrew's, always shows up with a big contingent to support us. I ask that in return, we support them spiritually and try to attend their Evensong on February 2 at 5:00 p.m.

Ash Wednesday is on **February 26**, and Lent begins. Just like in a venture (running, sports, weight-training, a speech in front of a large audience), we prep for the event. For example, we wouldn't pack the night before a long trip. Preparation for Lent is just as important so that we can focus our spirit and mind on those 40 days before Easter and hopefully beyond.

Some things to help prepare for Lent might include installing some apps on your phone to have in front of you wherever you are. Apps for the iPhone or iPad include "eCp" (Electronic Common Prayer book), which includes all the offices, daily readings, and prayers. Daily Prayer and



Daily Lectio are others. There are many others to search for in the app store. There are also newsletters you can sign up for: "The Catholic Company," "The Living Church," "Forward Movement," "Christian Century," and others. Let us prepare for a Lenten Journey with Christ and in the fellowship of his saints. If I can assist in any way, well . . . That's What Deacons Do. Amen. ~ Deacon Alex
