
RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,



What a difference a month makes. When I last wrote to you, our church was gearing up to celebrate the upcoming Advent and Christmas seasons. Even with a number of important

safety restrictions at play, we were



exploring new and creative ways to come together. But with our most recent suspension of public worship, we are

once again shifting our plans at Saint John's.

Beginning on Wednesday, December 2, we will launch a simple, but hopefully fulfilling Advent Program: The Advent Soup Conspiracy. This lighthearted initiative seeks to create an opportunity for us to be fed and to feed others; to stay connected and to reach out. I hope you will stop by the rectory porch on Wednesdays between 5 and 6 p.m. to pick up some soup for yourself and someone else. More information on The Advent Soup Conspiracy follows later in this issue.


For the rest of the year, we will continue livestreaming our Sunday parish mass at 10:00 a.m. After our livestream, the church will remain open for personal prayer and for reception of Holy Communion every Sunday until 1:00 p.m.

While nothing is set in stone for Christmas, we plan to livestream a mass on Christmas Eve. We're also in the early stages of planning an outdoor Christmas Eve offering and an at-home worship service for you and your family. Since music is one of the primary mediums for us to offer our praise and worship of

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God, Erik Clayton and I will soon be meeting to explore how we can safely gather to enjoy beloved Christmas carols and provide other musical offerings.

As our holiday plans at church and at home begin to take shape—and change and change again—our current pandemic is forcing us to observe a true Advent this year. I say this because



Advent is a time of waiting, and we have all been waiting for quite some time: waiting for a vaccine, waiting to see family and friends, waiting to return to work, waiting to return to school, and waiting to travel. In many ways, we have been observing Advent for nine months.

Much of the Old Testament deals with the people of God waiting: waiting to be set free from the bondage of Egypt, waiting to be fed in the wilderness, waiting for a just king, waiting to escape Babylonian captivity, and waiting to return to the house of the Lord. Through this pandemic, our waiting has been grafted on the waiting of the people of God. We now share in the eternal wait experienced by people throughout the world and throughout human history. But as we wait, we do so in hope and trust. We wait knowing that God has acted and that he will act in this world.

In Advent we wait for God's greatest gift: his Son, Jesus Christ. In his birth we witness goodness and humility take over the chaos of life. Through a gentle and vulnerable child, God changes the course of human history. So, as we wait, and continue to follow health protocols, we do so on God's path of salvation—a path upon which the sun of righteousness shines, illuminating the minds and hearts of medical researchers and health care staff and scattering the darkness of this world, allowing us to see God's Son being born in our midst, not only on Christmas Day, but every time goodness and humility fill our wait.

Although there is no Sunday school during this time, we continue with our weekly family video sermons and extension packages. This month the




children received an Advent wreath kit in the mail to use at home during family prayer. It is our hope to keep our youngest parishioners growing in their faith. ~Miss Ellen

I don't want to forget the Wednesday morning Mass—also done virtually.

Now we are back to all virtual services, and again, Fr. Carlos has spent many hours in getting new video equipment set up so that we are able to worship together via computer.

Jr. Warden's Report:




