RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends.

Last week, I attended my very first Grange Fair. I have to say, this much beloved Centre County emblem did not



disappoint. There was great food, all kinds of items for sale, charming animals (especially the horses), and a great sense of joy on the ground. I left the fair feeling full, not just because of the food, but by the spirit of community. My day there reminded me of how important it is to be together, if for no other reason than to simply be in each other's company.

While we need to think creatively about how we gather (taking additional health precautions when meeting indoors), being together matters. As we witness devastating events in our country and abroad, it is especially vital that we support each other and discern our roles as followers of the crucified and risen One. We can do this by praying for the needs of our fellow parishioners, the vulnerable, and the helpless, and by embracing God's presence in our midst.

As we welcome the Fall season, I'm happy to share with you that there are a number of ways beyond Sunday worship to come together. Children, youth, and families are invited to take part in our yearly Lakeside Worship & Learning event on September 12. This marks the beginning

of our children and youth formation program year, followed by the launch of our weekly Sunday School program and new monthly Youth Formation Program and Confirmation classes.



Also in September, we will launch our monthly worship and dinner series: Let us keep the Feast! We'll begin by celebrating the Feast of the Holy Cross on Tuesday, September 14, with mass at 5:30 p.m., followed by a Middle Eastern-inspired dinner at 6:00 p.m. on the rectory porch. We conclude the month with the return of our Fall parish picnic at the Dyakiw residence on September 26 following the 10:30 a.m. mass. More details on these offerings and other happenings appear later in this issue.

As I share with you a menu of offerings taking place at Saint John's this fall—with much more to come in October, including our much-cherished Blessing of the Animals on Sunday, October 10—I'm also aware of our need to follow public health guidelines. Our commitment to gather as the people of God does not negate our responsibility to promote the common good and health of all people. The vestry and I are keeping up to date with guidelines from the Diocese, the CDC, and the State's Department of Health.

Please continue to keep this parish in your prayers, as I continue to pray for all of you and those you have especially lifted up in our prayer list. May the risen Christ who has passed into the heavens clothe you with power and strength this day and always.

FROM THE DEACON'S PERCH

"For I was hungry, and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and



you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me."

We as a church family have been very active in our community, serving such organizations as Centre Crest, Centre County Correctional Facility, FaithCentre, PAWS, Centre Peace, Youth Services, and Bellefonte Elementary School. As you can see, we have been involved with ministry. As you read the passage from Matthew above, you will notice that there is no expiration date. I realize that sometimes we can get overwhelmed by all the needs in our small community; but when we have a poverty rate of 18.9% (32,500 people out of 168,000), the need is clear. I talk to many of the organizational leaders, who confirmed that it's still hard for them, with scarce resources available. The pandemic is not over. I understand we have pandemic fatigue and wish that all of this would go away—but it's not.

We are collecting items for Centre Care for the month of September. A list is available here in the newsletter of the items needed. Please be generous. Centre Care still has restricted visiting, so they need crafts to keep the residents occupied. Items of hygiene and personnel care products will be collected for the food bank as well. My role as deacon is to bring the cares of the world to the church and the church to the world. There are also programs sponsored by the national Episcopal Church to give donations. Episcopal Relief and Development will donate to Haiti as well as to our churches in the south that have been affected by Hurricane Ida.


Items for Centre Care:

FALL PARISH PICNIC



Our annual parish picnic will return this year! Like many of our beloved customs, it too has been reconfigured. However, this is not due to COVID; rather, it's to make it easier on our volunteers. After the success of our Pentecost cookout, we are following the same setup. The parish picnic will take place on Sunday, September 26, at the Dyakiw Residence (337 E. Curtin Street) immediately after the 10:30 a.m. mass. A food and drink sign-up link will appear in our weekly e-news, and a hard copy will be available at the back of the church.

FROM THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

As September arrives, our formation programs for children and youth begin. We will start on September 12 with Lakeside Worship and Learning, a family event that includes a worship service at Bald Eagle State Park. This year's theme, "The Great I AM," includes music, art, and activities that families will enjoy. We will also share a meal and a great day at the lake.

Sunday School classes for elementary school age children will begin the followin week, September 19, on a weekly schedule during the 10:30 service.

New this year are two types of classes for our teenagers: Youth Formation, a monthly Bible study and discussion during the 10:30 a.m. mass; and Confirmation classes for youth in the 7th grade and up, which will occur after the 10:30 service. Here is a schedule of future classes:

VESTRY NEWS (AUG. 18 MEETING)

Rector's Report:

Formation:

- Children and youth formation programs will relaunch in September.
- Youth Confirmation classes will begin in October, culminating in a Confirmation mass in May.

Coming together as a parish:

- Be together more, pray together more:
 - o Feast Day celebrations mass then dinner.
 - o Fall Parish Picnic (Sept. 26) -Worship in church then picnic at Dyakiw residence.

Diocese Convention:

- Business portion will be online.
- Two in-person gatherings in the Diocese, one near us (October).

Treasurer's Report:

- No red flags, on pace with pledges.
- Father Carlos we are very fortunate as a parish because of the creative spending and generosity of parishioners.

Sr. Warden's Report:

 Managed to get through mowing of grass with help from others. • Counting schedule for next year is complete and distributed.

Jr. Warden's Report (via Fr. Carlos):

- Formation room is being finished
- Working with Ellen to reconfigure the Sunday School room. Will be ready for September when formation programs begin.
- Landscaping: Suggestion to have an event for a Saturday in mid-October to clean up grounds.
- Plant shrubs in front of rectory.
- This coming Sunday there will be a special coffee hour with food from the garden.

New Business:

Columbarium Expansion:

- Father Carlos has done some research; suggests we send out a survey to the parish, along with a general funeral planning guide, to inquire about interest in a columbarium niche.
- Depending on responses, we would make decision on the design of the expansion.
- Treasurer reported that there is \$15K earmarked for the columbarium.
- Discussion on costs; Father Carlos will research.
- Father Carlos thanked vestry for entertaining this idea; he will come up with an action plan for the new year.

COVID Issues:

- Bishop's office sent an email stating that we are returning to wearing masks; Father Carlos will send an email to parish.
- Centre County is in substantial category of COVID cases with average cases of 18/19 a day.
- Concern as students return; we will continue to monitor cases in the area.
- Singing in worship Father Carlos suggested 2 hymns plus service music.


 Asked how people felt about this. Decided that we would take steps; first masking, then bring back singing.
- Roping off pews: Father Carlos didn't feel it was necessary since our church is large enough to accommodate everyone and people distance themselves naturally.


