RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends,

The month of June is full of Sunday feasts: Pentecost, Trinity Sunday, and Corpus Christi. We conclude the



Easter season on Pentecost as we celebrate the arrival of the Holy Spirit in the life of the Church. Please plan to join us after the 10:30 a.m. mass for a parish cookout at the Dyakiw residence – there's more information and a potluck sign-up link later in this issue of *The Herald*. If you've ever attended our parish cookouts, you know that you're in for a good time.

Our Sunday feasts continue with Trinity Sunday, a day designated to ponder the fullness of God's personhood, and Corpus Christi, a day designated to ponder our Lord's real presence in the Eucharist. These feast days are steeped in deep and rich theological revelation, worthy of celebrating because they reveal to us *who* God is. They show us God's desire to be in relationship with us: by sending his Holy Spirit, by revealing his full nature, and by offering himself in the holy sacrifice of the mass.



On Trinity Sunday, our choir will offer a choral mass setting: Palestrina's *Missa Brevis*. It will be a worship-enriching musical treat, and just in time, as Erik Clayton and many of our choir members will be traveling to Europe for a State College High School choral tour. Not long after Erik's return, I too will be out of the country attending a conference in Oxford, England, taking a pilgrimage to the Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham, and spending some time of rest and church tourism in London. I will be away from Sunday, June 26 (evening) until Saturday, July 9.

If you're in need of pastoral assistance during my absence, please be in touch with Deacon Alex Dyakiw. Father Kevin Barron will celebrate mass on Sunday, July 3, which is also his final Sunday with us serving as assisting clergy. Father Kevin has been with us since Fall of 2021, first serving as a deacon intern and then generously accepting my invitation to serve here once a month during his final year of employment at Penn State. While I will miss having Father Kevin with us every month, I know his ministry will strengthen ours as he serves as half-time priest at Saint Luke's, Altoona, and the Diocesan associate for Shaped by Faith. And don't worry, we will see Father Kevin back at Saint John's, serving as guest preacher once or twice a year; I made him promise that he will return! We will celebrate and give thanks for Father Kevin's time at Saint John's during coffee hour on **Sunday, July 3**.

As you read this, I'm sure that your air conditioners are running and fans are blowing. Thanks be to God for central air in the church! I know that summer is a perfect time to get away and visit family and friends, and I hope that you will take advantage of this. As we enter the summer heat, a much slower and relaxing time in the life of the Church, I look forward to seeing you on Sundays, at coffee hour on the Rectory porch, and around town. You will be in my prayers during my travels to England, especially since I plan to visit a church a day for daily mass and my previously mentioned hobby of Anglo-Catholic church tourism. Oh, the life of a priest!

My Dear Friends,

I didn't want to start my newsletter this way, but in the wake of the recent tragedies, I am reflecting on the past when many have been persecuted for taking a stand on race, ideals, human rights, war, basic needs, etc. But recently it's been just about *hatred*. Until we realize some mindset changes about the second amendment—and let me be clear about this, I am not advocating taking that constitutional right away—nothing will change. But times have changed. We have moved from the muzzle-loading method to modern high-capacity weapons that can be used not to kill game, but human beings. They can be purchased by anyone 18 years and older, no matter their mental state, without a background check in some states.

Until our leaders listen to 85-95% of the public opinion who are in favor of changing gun laws, all we have left is prayer. As the apostle Paul stated in 1 Thessalonians, "Pray without ceasing." Like many others, I continue to pray for our national and local leaders to understand that we need change.

May was one of St. John's busiest months that I can remember. We had a very successful fundraiser for the Ukraine, with the corned beef breakfast, pancakes, and eggs. Thank you to all who helped to cook, serve, clean, and participate. We collected \$1500, and it all went to the Ukraine. Thrivent Ministry has helped us with many projects with a \$250 grant. I would like to thank Peggy Jackson for working with Thrivent to provide the grants for us in our various fundraisers.

The Monday night men's group will be finishing another book on spiritual development, and we will begin a new book in June. We invite anyone who is interested to join our study. We always pray for the empty chair in the midst of us.

Centre Care has opened again to volunteers and family, so I will resume visiting and will be on call for emergencies. We have restarted the Liturgy of the Word on the third Thursday of the month. A big thanks to Deb Cree for providing music at each month's service. The residents have welcomed my preaching but

begged me not to sing. God bless them and their desire to attend services.

On May 27 we dedicated a new Veterans Memorial to our resident veterans and families at Centre Care. We had an honor guard and 21-gun salute. The young man pictured in the Marine uniform is also the head cook at Centre Care.



After my many calls to the County Prison, the warden said that maybe I can begin offering life recovery classes again in June as soon as the COVID numbers stay below a certain level. Please pray for this ministry to continue. I meet many released citizens, and they all say how the program has helped them to begin anew and to ease into community recovery programs.

Our church family continues to provide "Out Of The Cold" with meals at least a few times



a month with the help of the Deacon's Discretionary Fund. There is an offering envelope for June; your help is appreciated with that program at OOTC.

We are helping some Centre Care employees with gas cards for those who live in Lock Haven, Penns Valley, and the surrounding area. I can't help but feel upset when people have to choose between dinner and gasoline.

Planet Fitness is offering free access during June, July, and August for youth under 18.



They must have a parent or guardian with them. They can also sign up for the chance to receive a \$5000 scholarship. This is a great opportunity to beat some of the

summer heat and get some exercise.

On Sunday, June 5, we will have a church picnic at our home. Please try to attend and

spend time with your church family; it's a great time to gather after all this absence and COVID separation.




PB & J (AND CEREAL) COLLECTION RESUMES

VESTRY NEWS


- Full Easter season
 - o Confirmation service had 55 in attendance.
 - o Special mention to Ellen Dyakiw; if not for Ellen, none of this would have happened.
- Children/Youth Formation
 - o Entering a phase of discernment.
 - o Father Carlos has some ideas, but will discuss with Ellen first.
- Shaped by Faith
 - o Entering the phase of applying for grants.
 - o Presiding Bishop Michael Curry will be in the Diocese June 10-12.
 - o Buses will be available to shuttle to Harrisburg for the service on the 11th.
 - o Bishop will be in Bellefonte June 10 (9:00 a.m.–12:00 p.m.).
- New seminarian news
 - o Kevin Lowe has asked to do his internship with us.
 - o A small committee of about 4-5 members is needed to provide feedback.
 - o We will pay him \$1K for a year; 10 hours of work a week.
 - o Starts in August/September; 3 Sundays a month.
- Ongoing Projects
 - o Floor Update: June 13th is working date.
- Columbarium


- o Price is \$2K higher than originally thought. Cost is now \$27K due to increasing costs.

- o Majority of monies (\$25K) will come from money market account; remainder will be taken from reserves.
- o Chart giving examples of cost was shared with vestry. Showed cremation services as of today are \$2,800.
- o Suggestions of selling units, investing upfront.
- o Where would money go? No earmarking, just go into bank account.
- Picture Directory
 - o Current church management system, Breeze, has capabilities to create a picture directory.
 - o Peggy Jackson and Deb Cree will work on taking pictures after the services. Download to computer, then data will be linked to parishioner records.
