My dear friends in Christ,

In the past few weeks we have heard readings from the gospel of John concerning bread and wine. "I am the bread of life,"

Jesus says, but what does it mean? His apostles sure had questions. In *Holy Moments*, Matthew Kelly describes a holy moment as one *in which we open ourselves to*

God. When does that happen for you? Is it when you receive communion and go back to your pew and talk to God? Or do you engage in some holy listening and just open yourself to God? It doesn't always happen to me, but when it does, I truly feel the divine presence.

I think that God's presence has been visible at St. John's this summer in several important ways.

First, Kevin Lowe was ordained to the priesthood in July at St. Andrews. What a service it was! Fr. Kevin had his jazz band there and they performed religious music fantastically. He was called to St. Andrews-Lewisburg, and so we should pray for his new ministry and give thanks for his three years of serving St. John's.

Second, St. John's has called a new priest, the Rev. Ruth Ferguson. I am so grateful to the vestry and especially to the search committee who have done the hard work of discerning the right person for us. While we have been without a priest in the past year, who has kept things running? Please thank Larry Roberson for his attention to the nuts and bolts of a lively parish, not just broadcasting our Sunday services but also lining up supply preachers.

I know that we'll all be excited to meet our new priest, but what is most important is that we help her strengthen the mission and

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ministry of our parish. What is God calling us to be? What are our greatest strengths and opportunities? This will be a time of renewal for St. John's, a new beginning.

Third, we have been busy! Thanks to the leadership of Jeff Wilson and lots of volunteers, we have completed the improvements in the parish house. Our new priest will be delighted with her new home on Lamb Street.

We have completed our discussion of C.S. Lewis's classic book, Mere Christianity, and the Men's Bible Study resumes on September 9th at 7 p.m. The group has met for almost 25 years. Do you know someone who needs an invitation?

With your generosity I continue to get meals for Out of the Cold, support our food bank, and help the women's resource center and the strangers who approach our church needing gas money or bus money.

More than 20 niches are still available in our columbarium. The purchase price through 2024 is \$1525. Based on 2023 information



from Wetzler Funeral Home. typical cremation cost is \$2800, with final costs of \$4200. This does not include an urn, niche, funeral service. or access to a reception hall. **Traditional** funeral/burial costs frequently exceed \$10,000, not including a church service or

use of reception facilities. A simple gravestone costs around \$7000.


