RECTOR'S LETTER

Dust!

Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return.



But ponder this: the dust that is us joins us to one another as surely as it joins us to the prehistoric life that greened or roamed the earth before us. By our dust, we are joined to the stars exploding beyond us and the cosmos itself. In the words of Thomas Berry, a "Wild Church" enthusiast (see Adela Germano's book review later in this newsletter), the "the universe, by definition, is a single, gorgeous celebratory event."

The dust that is us is inseparable from that event!

The Great Litany and the Prayers of the People in our Prayer Book k the practice of Lent itself—is evidence that we are highly sophisticated dust, capable and conscious of helping or harming our interrelatedness. The ashes on our foreheads are not a sign of curse but of reassurance that it is safe to die, that our origin and ending is always in God. At the cellular level, our bodies are dying and being born almost simultaneously, every minute, every day. Our bodies know that they enter into the world dying, that they are made up of birth and death. We are not immortal. In a culture that turns its face from death and dust—that spreads plastic grass around the earthen graves we dig—there is healing in the ashen cross drawn across our foreheads: we *know* that we are mortal, but we forget that our mortal bodies contain the memory of birth as surely as they recognize the death that is part of their making. What if we saw Lent as an invitation to live in our bodies instead of denying them? To live in the desert as one with the dust of this fragile earth, our island home?

PARISH PHOTO DIRECTORY




It's time to update our parish photo directory. If you did not have your picture taken last year or if you began attending Saint John's *after* our last

Huntingdon, and Ted will continue to serve at St. Andrew's.




